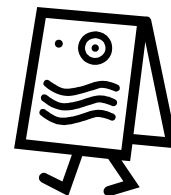
*The Village Hall Steering Group have always had the view, based on talking to a number of other village halls, that such a large building must have a bar / lounge to create enough income to make the building largely self-financing. Also it is an integral part of creating a social centre and meeting place for the village.*

*The alternative view is that the money required to provide this would be better spent on other things.*

*By the time you read this the Steering Group will have met to consider how to go forward. It's not finally confirmed when I write this, but I'm pretty sure that another village meeting to consider the pros and cons of each view is on the cards. And if so it will be on Tuesday 19<sup>th</sup> May, at 7:30. This will be one village meeting that it is really essential you be at; the whole future of the village hall will be shaped by it.*

In the meantime preparations are going ahead for a VE Day bash. We have lined up a super band, to play period swing and jazz - they're even bringing in a trumpeter from Poland (I still haven't worked out the significance of that). Full details on page 4, but as a sneak preview keep Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> July free.

Finally, Samantha refuses to walk round the village with sandwich boards any more. So a new notice board, to replace the one that was by the second village entrance, will be delivered this weekend and subject to getting a working party assembled will be in use in the next two weeks. Another one to replace the remains of the one near the pond has been ordered for June. We got a refund to recover a large part of the costs of the original ones, which the Borough Council paid for, as they haven't lasted as they should have.

**This is all complete nonsense.**

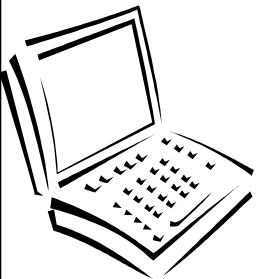
As you will see from the front page there is debate to decide exactly what we want the village hall to be. However, whilst far be it from me to fiddle around with fancy things like a “Vision” for the village hall, the vision for the village hall goes something like (as we haven’t fiddled around to wordcraft one) this:

*The village hall is a facility for villagers that aims to meet the needs of a wide range of village user groups, at reasonable prices. Within this it has a key role as a social centre and meeting place for villagers. However it should be self-financing as far as possible and not a burden on the community (any deficit can only be met from the pockets of villagers) and therefore will seek to raise income to meet running costs by providing services to other groups. These services will not be at the expense of meeting the needs of villagers, or cause undue inconvenience to villagers.*

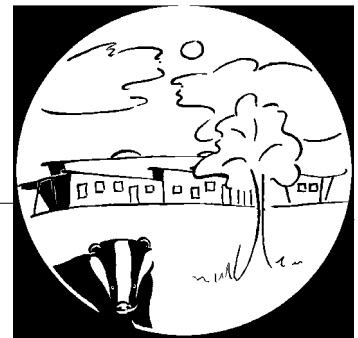
**Country dancing club:** Mawsley School are starting a new country dancing club after school on Wednesday's 3.15 p.m. – 4.15 p.m.

*I can't believe how spoilt for choice I am for this edition. Huge thanks to all the Mawsleyites who have emailed, phoned or dropped information through the letterbox. Sadly I shall only be able to use some of your tips this time, but please don't be disheartened, keep sending me your finds.*

- A group of us, masquerading as 'The Mawsley Dinner Ladies' went for supper at **The Swan at Lamport**, recently. I can't believe the transformation ... if you went before it was done up, you need to see it now. It's fabulous ... more expensive than a pub meal, methinks, but nevertheless, we had a great 'bistro' evening and were very well looked after by the management.
- Many thanks to Nicky who's been telling me where to go, so to speak, regarding farmers markets:

### **Glebe Farm, Kettering A14 - J7**

Fruit & Veg along with a small gift shop, plus cheese & meat section ...great bread and a small garden section. Great Tea Shop too!

### **Smiths Farm Shop Kingsthorpe**

Turn right at Boughton roundabout from Brixworth, just expanded ... great for fruit and veg and a great frozen section (salmon, king prawns, roasted veg, pastries) plus bread & cakes open all week and weekends

And Pat reminded me of **Arcadia Organics** at Weekley - see their large advert in the Mawsley Advertiser. As well as the usual veg, meat, fish and cheese he also has organic wines and delivers to Mawsley on Fridays.

- Lots of people are recommending butchers to me. **Chambers Butchers in Brixworth** is, apparently, a good family butchers and the place for the renowned Brixworth pate ... but the one I fancy trying out is **Sauls of Spratton**. Yet again, a good butchers, award winners for their sausages, BUT they also make home made dinners, shepherds pie, lasagne, chill con carne etc. Buy out of the freezer or take your own dish and they will fill it for you. Can't be bad!! And if you value local meat you won't beat **Home Farm at Pytchley**. All their meat is home grown. Pat says try the pork for its 'crackling' qualities.
- For those of us who need a Garden Centre fix at this time of the year, Jan says that we should try **Meadow Lane Garden Centre in Great Cransley**. It's fairly new and very local. Small but stocking good plants at good prices; it has a gift shop and coffee shop/restaurant. Worth a mooch ... especially if you still have the 10% discount voucher, which was put through the door earlier this year. It's only valid until the 29th April, so you've no excuse.
- Lastly - one place I haven't mentioned before and think I should is **The Spencer Arms in Chapel Brampton** ... It's one of the Chef and Brewer Pubs - highly recommended by villagers who love their grub and like a friendly, informal pub atmosphere.

*Don't forget ... these are your finds and this is your 'Grapevine'. If you have found a restaurant, walk, garden centre, shop ... whatever ... and you think it's worth telling other villagers ... tell me and I'll pass it on.*

## Reading Group

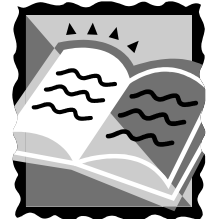

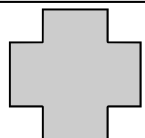
