Getting up to speed - news from the horse's mouth

Village Hall

By the time you read this work may have started on the village hall – certainly Wimpey have informed us that they have let the contract. So that brings into sharp focus what are we going to do when it opens towards the end of this year.

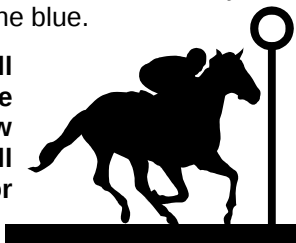
We would like to see the village hall as a vibrant social centre for the village; offering a wide range of facilities for a wide range of user groups of all ages. What's more we want to be able to do so at a balance of minimal cost to users yet enable it to be profitable – otherwise we shall all have to fund it in some way.

The draft business plan clearly shows that we have to make full use of it as quickly as possible, which in turn means having it fitted out fully - ideally from day one. Hence the point we made in the recent Race Night flyer, that **we need to raise around £45,000 to fit it out completely. That's a lot of dosh, so we're going to have to go at full speed to get there.** The Fund Raising Group and the Youth Group are looking at potential grants that may be available, and there will be a real focus on raising cash throughout this year.

So, to the direct plea. **This is *your* village hall. You can help in some way to raise the money we need to make it a really first class facility. Your ideas and your help – no matter how small – are vital.** Just contact anybody on the parish council or MVA. The money won't raise itself and nobody is going to send us cash out of the blue.

For starters, there are still some tickets left for the Race Night tomorrow (Saturday 29th Jan): just call either Theresa (791539) or myself (791447) – now !

By the way, this doesn't include funds for kit any groups may need. Samantha wants to start a Tai Chi Yang Sword group, but that group will have to provide the swords, mats etc. (and the bandages). So if you are involved in a group who will want to use the hall, you might need to get your own fund raising going too.



Unsung heroes

Moving on - to unsung heroes. I'd like to mention a couple of people this time.

Firstly Mary Rose Dolan-Holland. Mary Rose welcomes new people into the village, by visiting them in their new home, presenting them with the welcome pack and talking about the village. We know that many of you have really found this refreshing and welcoming. Thanks to Mary Rose who spends many hours doing this.

Secondly Stu Randle. Stu has just resigned from the MVA after 3 years of unstinting effort. We always found Stu's thoughtful approach really helpful, and a great discipline. Work pressures mean Stu has decided to give the MVA a rest for a while. Stu – thanks for all your efforts; they really did make a big difference and you will be sorely missed.

Village landscape

I mentioned a while ago that we have been trying to get the village open spaces more under control. Peter Harris of the Borough Council has completed the first phase (covering the David Wilson area) of his assessment of what needs to be done; he should work through the rest of the village in the next few weeks. Peter's very thorough work will give us a clear set of requirements that we can monitor to ensure they are being met.

Re-organisation

Finally some changes to the Borough Council's committee structure mean that the quarterly meeting we used to have with them and Wimpey has been discontinued, now that the parish council is up and running. We always found these meetings very useful; however the good news is that Wimpey have agreed to come along to parish council meetings to keep us informed. Don't forget you can come too !

From the Parish Council.....

Many complaints are being received about the amount of dog "waste" that still appears around Mawsley. Adoption of Mawsley Roads

A common question asked at Village Meetings is "When will the roads be finished, adopted and proper speed limits introduced?". The usual answer is "When building is finished!"

In the last few days we have received further advice on this matter from the Highways Department of the County Council. The general position is that, on completion of development, roads will be finished to the required standard by the developers and they will be "adopted" by the County Council 12 months after completion subject to them remaining in good repair. Until the main "spine" roads in the village are complete (those which connect to the currently maintained public highway), no other areas of the village will be adopted. So, whilst those of you in and around Old Gorse Way have a finished road surface, it will be the responsibility of the developers to maintain the road for the foreseeable future.

It is therefore very likely that we are still two to three years away from fully completed roads in many parts of the village and a similar period away from the implementation of permanent traffic calming measures. Anything you can do in the meantime to ensure safety on the roads of the village will be appreciated!"

Pub prospects

Wimpey have recently informed the Parish Council and Villagers Association that potential purchasers of the 'pub site' believe that there is inadequate space for parking.

After considerable discussion and consideration the MVA and MPC has agreed in principle to a request to release .2 of an acre of land from the playing field to the pub site. This agreement is conditional on final plans and particularly the impact on:

- the existing plans relating to the Community Centre
- the layout of the playing field, including the cycle track
- the existing hedgerow which divides the playing field from the pub site.

We will report further developments.

Storage Facility

Thanks are extended to Messer's George Wimpey who have very kindly provided storage space within the village for the various items acquired over the last three years by the Villagers Association. If you are one of the village residents who is looking after items of MVA property, call Richard Meredith (791539) and he will arrange for it to be moved to the central repository.

Dear Commercial Vehicle Drivers,

We all know that in today's working environment we are all expected to bring work home with us. In some cases, the work brought home is the commercial vehicle you are required to drive all day.

Most work that is brought home is taken into the house and you would not consider dropping it in at a neighbour's house for them to look after overnight. Why then do some of you find it necessary to park your commercial vehicles anywhere other than your own drive or in your own garage? If you do not want to look at the vehicle you drive all day, why do you think your neighbours would want to?

Have some thought for your fellow villagers. If you have to park your commercial vehicle overnight, please do it outside your own house and not abandoned, for example, on the pavement in Nethertown Way, facing the wrong way in Loddington Way or making it difficult for residents who live in Symonds Way to park there.

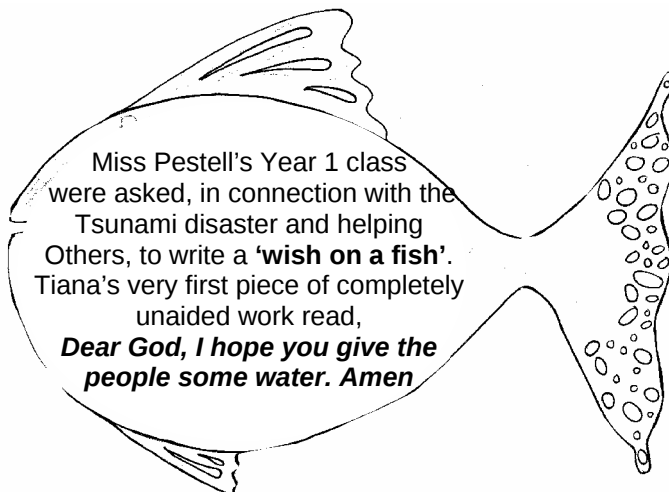
During the Christmas holidays we also contributed Art work from all four classes to an exhibition at the Alfred East Art Gallery in Kettering. (See picture.)

Special thanks to the Redgraves who contributed the Christmas trees for the raffle. NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH



Leading up to Christmas and the festive season Mawsley Village enjoyed its own nights of revelry which included:

- damage being caused to two cars parked overnight in Main Street and Link Lane car park
- the Flag Pole in the Wimpey sales office car park being destroyed along with paint sprayed onto the door of the Options Centre
- the contents of litter bins and broken glass being tipped onto the same car park.
- empty alcohol bottles and litter left on the roadside
- and the log feature at the entrance into Loddington Way being demolished.

Whether this is down to local residents or visitors it is something we can do without and with your help, and the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme, perhaps this year we can minimise crime and damage.

This year we have already had a burglary in the village, whereby a window was removed and entry gained. This occurred in the early hours of the 8th January.

Since the last newsletter we have delivered details of your Sector Representatives. By now you should have received your Neighbourhood Watch pack. If not these will be with you soon. I am still awaiting delivery of the small Neighbourhood Watch stickers and as soon as I have them they will be distributed.

Don't forget you should be entitled to a discount with your household insurance if you are a member of a Neighbourhood Watch scheme, and also there are other benefits which are detailed in the pack. I have also provided a number of packs to the site office representative at Wimpey homes for her to give out to new residents moving into the village.

Our next meeting of the Neighbourhood Watch committee, is on the 17th February at 8pm, so if there are any concerns or issues you wish to raise, could you contact either myself or your Sector Representative prior to this date.

Last but not least, no other volunteers have come forward for the following areas to act as Sector Representatives:

Badgers Lane, Hares Run,

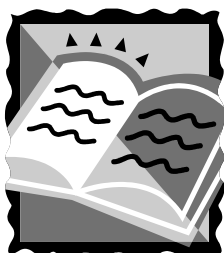

Wildlife Watch

Now is a good time of year to put up nest boxes, because it gives your birds time to get used to them before breeding in the Spring.



Some birds squeeze into very tight holes-indeed; the Nuthatch plasters the entrance with mud to make it the right shape and size; others, such as Robins, prefer an open fronted box with easier access. So vary the type of boxes you put up so that you offer a range of hole sizes.

Where you locate nest boxes in your garden is as important as which type of box you choose. Avoid placing them in direct sunshine, and do not face them into prevailing winds - on both counts pointing East is a good bet, but your local situation may dictate otherwise. Don't put them too high - about 2-3m off the ground for most species is fine. If you fix them to walls rather than trees, they are harder for cats, squirrels and other predators to reach.

There is a constant procession of Blue Tits visiting bird tables during the short January days. In winter, good food supplies are important for both sexes. Females need to maintain their body weight in order to reach Spring in good breeding condition, and the male's plumage has to be in top shape to attract females. Blue Tits were the third most common garden visitors in last year's RSPB Big Garden Bird Watch.



As Winter really begins to bite, and Birch and Alder seeds are harder to find, Siskins appear in gardens with increasing frequency. They are delightful to look at but amazingly aggressive, easily capable of seeing off much larger Greenfinches in competition for food at the bird table.

Lastly don't forget to keep birdtables and feeders regularly topped up with coconut halves and fat balls. Also make sure your bird baths are free from ice and topped up with fresh water.
