When the going gets tough.....

Well there's so much happening - everything seems to be coming at us in all directions – I don't know where to start.

Yes, I do, I'll start with the good news. Following the AGM we now have four new members of the MVA main Committee: Alison Williams, John Holton, Allan MacDonald and Rob Mallinson. Welcome to you all and we look forward to the fresh ideas you bring.

As I hinted at the beginning it has been a slightly rocky road of late. We keep hearing all kinds of rumours floating around. For example one currently is that "the MVA are looking to set up a community centre to be used by their own businesses and not by anyone from the village". I don't know where to start with this. It's such complete rubbish. What businesses? How can people say such things?

The MVA is not some secret society. A relatively small number of people - all with full time occupations and no more spare time than anyone else - are putting in a lot of effort to create a community, with more facilities than we would otherwise get. And it's there to represent *your* interests. If it's not doing so, then please say so.

We know we don't get everything right, but we do listen. There have been murmurings that the requirements of under 5's are not being considered enough. Well they are now. A number of mums got together a couple of weeks ago to spell out what they want and there has been a village survey re pre-school. I went along to that meeting to say how useful it was for them to form a co-ordinated view. This has resulted in a request from them to set up a new MVA sub-group, to represent the under 5's. The MVA agreed unanimously and it has already started work.

Incidentally the point has been made that we are considering giving young people free use of the village hall but charging for room hire for under 5's. "I paid subs when I went to Youth group/scouts etc so why can't they?" A fair point and we will probably be charging for both.

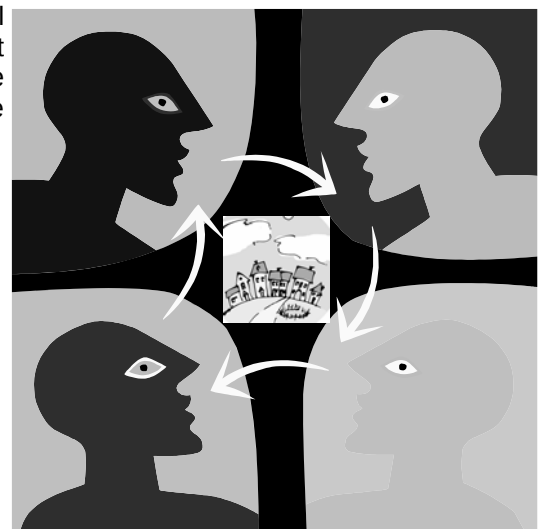
We are also aware that there is some feeling that fund raising is becoming too much. Maybe this was behind the disappointing ticket sales for the VE Night bash. So much effort has gone into to this, as with all events, and it's a bit dispiriting to see such a poor response. Perhaps it was priced a bit too high or it just didn't appeal. We would like to know your views, either directly or via the editor if you wish. On this topic you can contact the editor anonymously and your responses will be passed to the MVA.

Regardless of that possible view we have to carry on. The village hall has to be fitted out if we are to be able to use it. We are not just spending money on the bar (another rumour), though a decent lounge is not provided within the specification we are getting so we will have to create it after the builders have finished.

Another current rumour is "the kitchen is only suitable for making teas and coffees so it won't be possible to use the hall for parties". Not true; we will have as much catering equipment in the kitchen as we can fit in. But it has to be paid for.

Anyway enough of my ranting. Samantha has told me to shut up and get ready for the VE Night bash. If you're not going then pity - it's going to be a cracking do. (See the back page of the Mawsley Advertiser for a last minute report and photos of the 'do'. Editor)

Wimpey Update

Colin Williams, the new Land and Planning Director of George Wimpey East Midlands attended the last Parish Council meeting to provide an update and hear representations from the village.

He brought good news on two fronts:

1. Draining and levelling of the playing fields will begin this month and seeding and planting should take place in September or October.
2. Terms for the sale of the pub site have been agreed with a purchaser, but at the date of the meeting contracts had not been exchanged.

At a rather more mundane level he was asked if he would

- speed up the process for agreeing where we may put our new notice boards;
- get the village map (at the entrances to the village) updated;
- consider improved lighting at the two entrances;
- get something done about the dangerous raised ironworks in Chambers Hill and
- take steps to stop contractors speeding through the village.

On this latter point particularly he said that Wimpey were as concerned about this as we are.

Planning Applications

The Parish Councillors wish villagers to be aware that all planning applications submitted to KBC come through the PC for approval or objection. Any resident who is concerned about their own or a neighbour's application is welcome to make representations about it to the Parish Council.

The law on motor vehicles

At the request of the police the Parish Council has arranged for the distribution to the whole village of the enclosed information leaflets about the use of scooters, gopeds and mini motorcycles. This is to clarify the law relating to these vehicles.

We have also been asked to point out that the police have the same powers of confiscation of any motor vehicles being used off road and causing a nuisance. This would apply to their use on open land in and around the village.

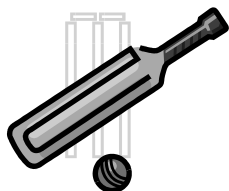
